Answers

b) In hospital

Sadly, even though most of us would like to remain at home and die in our own bed, around 50% of people aged over 65 years die in hospital.

c) In an aged care home

For people aged 85 and over, residential aged care is the most common place of death (50%). Aged care is already supporting many older people at the end of life.

a) 79.7 years for men and 85.0 years for women

Fifty years ago people over 80 only made up 1.4% of the population. Now, even though our population is much bigger, people over 80 make up 4.3% of our population. Many of these will be involved with aged care.

b) Dementia including Alzheimer's disease and e) Coronary heart disease

Coronary heart disease becomes more common after in people over 45 years but for those over 85 years dementia is the leading underlying cause of death. Palliative care awareness, knowledge and skills are needed by aged care staff.

All four

Aged Providers need to carry out all four actions to meet the palliative care and end-of-life care outcomes in Outcome 5.7. The Strengthened Aged Care Standards have noted the importance of palliative care and end-of-life care.

All three are possible

Death is a reality of life. When someone who is registered with My Aged Care passes away, the family or a responsible person will need to let My Aged Care know so that their record can be closed.

Why does this matter?

There are many aspects of death and dying in Australia. But our population is ageing and as we age our need for care can increase. Aged care has a special role in helping older people to live well. We need to consider how we can provide effective, respectful and compassionate care as older people come to the end of their life.
